Helping Hands Assistance Program

The Helping Hands Grant program is designed to assist Wisconsin low-income manufactured homeowners who need critical repairs to their primary residence. Critical home repairs are those that are essential to remain in the home. The program does not include those items deemed to be cosmetic in nature.


Applicants must meet all requirements of the grant program:

- The applicant must own the home for 12 months or more.
- The home must be a 1976 model or newer.
- The total household income must be at or below 50% of the state median income.
- The home must be considered decent, safe, and sanitary.

Water Heater/Furnace Replacement Program

The Water Heater/Furnace Replacement Program is a grant available to assist Wisconsin low-income manufactured homeowners who need a water heater or furnace replacement to their primary residence. Applicants must meet all requirements of the grant program:

- The applicant must own the home for 12 months or more.
- The home must be a 1976 model or newer.
- The total household income must be at or below 50% of the state median income.
- The home must be considered decent, safe, and sanitary.

This household includes a minimum wage worker, his disabled wife and two children. This is how they described the repair beforehand:

“Roof is caving in the bathroom and leaking into the bathroom and children’s bedroom closet.”
